### Traditional Māori Welcome

#### Whakatau at Frankley School

- New whānau (families) will be sent an invitation with details of time and date.
- On the day of the Whakatau, new learners and their whānau meet outside the front of the school, or office foyer if wet.
- The Wāhine (women and girls) will be at the front of the group with the Tāne (men and boys) at the back and sides.
- A karanga (call) will be made by a female, either staff or students, to invite you into the Whare Hui (Hall).
- After taking off your shoes, you will Hongi (press noses) with staff and community members.
- A male teacher/student/community member takes on the role of Tangata Whenua (Hosts) sharing a whaikorero (welcoming speech) in Māori, which is followed by a waiata (song) sung by the school.
- After the official part, we share a cup of tea and kai (food).



A Whakatau is a traditional Māori welcome that takes place off a Marae.
